No. 13. Ramsay Heatley TRAQUAIR FRS,FGS

(30th July 1840 - 22nd Nov. 1912)

Professor of Zoology, Royal College of Science, Dublin, 1867-73; Keeper of Natural History, Royal Scottish Museum, Edinburgh, 1873-1906; He specialized in fossil fish of the Palaeozoic and was responsible for many of the advances in fossil ichthyology between 1877 - 1900.

Royal Scottish Museum, Edinburgh has the majority of his type material (see Henrichsen, Roy. Scottish Mus., Inform. Ser., 1970, 1971, 1972).

Liverpool Univ, Dept. of Geology. Has some ORS fish from Caithness which have Traquair labels.

BMNH, London. Has ORS material from Nairn; & a selection of fossil fish purchased in 1914.

Also has a series of letters written between 1887 and 1909 in Archives of Palaeont. Library.
